10 warning signs of Alzheimer's:

Memory loss that disrupts daily life

One of the most common signs of Alzheimer's is memory loss, especially forgetting recently learned information. Others include forgetting important dates or events; asking for the same information over and over; increasingly needing to rely on memory aids (e.g., reminder notes or electronic devices) or family members for things they used to handle on their own.

What's a typical age-related change?

Sometimes forgetting names or appointments, but remembering them later.

Challenges in planning or solving problems

Some people may experience changes in their ability to develop and follow a plan or work with numbers. They may have trouble following a familiar recipe or keeping track of monthly bills. They may have difficulty concentrating and take much longer to do things than they did before.

What's a typical age-related change?

Making occasional errors when balancing a checkbook.

Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home, at work or at leisure

People with Alzheimer's often find it hard to complete daily tasks. Sometimes, people may have trouble driving to a familiar location, managing a budget at work or remembering the rules of a favorite game.

What's a typical age-related change?

Occasionally needing help to use the settings on a microwave or to record a television show.

4 Confusion with time or place

People with Alzheimer's can lose track of dates, seasons and the passage of time. They may have trouble understanding something if it is not happening immediately. Sometimes they may forget where they are or how they got there.

What's a typical age-related change?

Getting confused about the day of the week but figuring it out later.

Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships

For some people, having vision problems is a sign of Alzheimer's. They may have difficulty reading, judging distance and determining color or contrast, which may cause problems with driving.

What's a typical age-related change?

Vision changes related to cataracts.

New problems with words in speaking or writing

People with Alzheimer's may have trouble following or joining a conversation. They may stop in the middle of a conversation and have no idea how to continue or they may repeat themselves. They may struggle with vocabulary, have problems finding the right word or call things by the wrong name (e.g., calling a "watch" a "hand-clock").

What's a typical age-related change? Sometimes having trouble finding the right word.



Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps

A person with Alzheimer's disease may put things in unusual places. They may lose things and be unable to go back over their steps to find them again. Sometimes, they may accuse others of stealing. This may occur more frequently over time.

What's a typical age-related change?

Misplacing things from time to time and retracing steps to find them.



Decreased or poor judgment

People with Alzheimer's may experience changes in judgment or decision-making. For example, they may use poor judgment when dealing with money, giving large amounts to telemarketers. They may pay less attention to grooming or keeping themselves clean.

What's a typical age-related change?

Making a bad decision once in a while.



Withdrawal from work or social activities

A person with Alzheimer's may start to remove themselves from hobbies, social activities, work projects or sports. They may have trouble keeping up with a favorite sports team or remembering how to complete a favorite hobby. They may also avoid being social because of the changes they have experienced.

What's a typical age-related change?

Sometimes feeling weary of work, family and social obligations.



Changes in mood and personality

The mood and personalities of people with Alzheimer's can change. They can become confused, suspicious, depressed, fearful or anxious. They may be easily upset at home, at work, with friends or in places where they are out of their comfort zone.

What's a typical age-related change?

Developing very specific ways of doing things and becoming irritable when a routine is disrupted.



To all Swiss in the Lower Mainland: A call for action!

A chapter for the Swiss community in Vancouver will come to an end very soon unless you act. The Outdoors Club of the Swiss Society was founded in 1977 and has greatly contributed to the social fabric of the Swiss community in the Vancouver area. Remember the car rallies, many notable mountain climbs, ski trips, hikes, camping trips, canoeing and bicycle excursions, picnics, almost 40 Waldweihnacht, support for many dances and August 1st celebrations, etc? Most notable was the construction, maintenance and management of the Mt Baker cabin in Glacier Springs, a beautiful building with room for 25, close to the Mt Baker Ski and hiking area. It fostered many great and memorable events.

Many friendships have been forged which will last a life time.

The Swiss Outdoors Club and its cabin management have to a large part been led by a team of volunteers which stayed on since the clubs inception. We are getting older, tired and must pass on the leadership to a fresh group of outdoor enthusiasts. We have cried for help for many years and have found a few young souls for which we are grateful. But it is not enough; we need new leadership and a generational change.

Under the present circumstances we cannot continue as usual as it is a slow lingering death for the club and all we stand for.

At our AGM this January we have decided to give the Executive 6 months to rejuvenate and seek a fresh leadership with the enthusiasm needed to take over. If this is not possible and nobody comes forward, the Outdoors Club will cease to exist. Key positions of our executive have agreed to stay on until then.

This will mean the following:

The Outdoors Club activities will gradually stop and a few hikes may become privately sponsored events.

The Waldweihnacht will no longer be organized.

The Mt Baker cabin management will be handed over to the cabin's legal owner, the Swiss Society. It will then decide if it should be sold or kept and upgraded with a few needed major repairs.

We want to explicitly state that this is not about the cabin. This is about the Outdoors Club and missing volunteers for a continued successful operation. You cannot expect that the same group keeps handling all affairs forever until we are senile and die!

The cabin continues to be well used and is in good shape. Last year we made important investments into new kitchen appliances and lighting, hence our financials took a hit in conjunction with a difficult winter with many cancellations. But there are enough funds to operate the cabin for another 2 years.

The Outdoors Club has 140 members. This represents a rather significant percentage of the Swiss Society membership which is 325.

We urge you to come forward and continue what we have done for 40 years. We know that the Swiss Society and Swiss community will sadly miss the Outdoors Club and all we did once we are gone. By the end of July 2017 it will be all over and history unless you act!

To keep going you can help as follows:

- join the Executive: we need a President, Vice President, Treasurer, Trip Coordinator, Trip Leaders, Secretary, Cabin management volunteers
- come to the cabin and use it. Bring groups and organize outdoors and social events in the Baker area.
- motivate Swiss to join the Swiss Society and the Outdoors Club
- promote the Cabin to non-Swiss Individuals and Groups to enhance the income of the cabin
- share pride in our achievements and preserve them for the future generations.


