#### Why Creative People Age Better Posted: 07/26/2014 from the "Canada Living"

Do creative and artistically inclined people have advantages over the rest of us mere mortals who can barely draw a stick figure or whistle a simple tune? There are indications that individuals who are able to use their talents also tend to fare better in other ways, including their physical and mental health, compared to others whose existence mainly consists of repetitiveness and routine. Still, scientists have never been able to prove that creativity is indeed a contributing factor to humans' well-being.

<u>Picasso</u> was undoubtedly one of the most creative persons one can think of, and he maintained a zest for life and work well into his 90s. But so was <u>Mozart</u>, who tragically died at 35 years of age. <u>Hemingway</u>, perhaps the greatest writer of his generation, couldn't pen a single word for long periods of time -- mostly because of drunkenness. Some famous artists have looked upon their gift as a <u>curse</u> rather than a blessing. So, should we assume any connection between creativity and well-being at all?

One <u>study</u> that looked into the health status and life expectancy of creative people found that creativity may indeed be associated with delayed decline in cognitive and physical health at an advanced age. While it remains unclear whether engaging in creative activities or the use of creative energies actually contribute to the slowing of the natural aging process, it is conceivable, according to the researchers, that creative people find better ways of coping with their diminishing capabilities than their less resourceful counterparts. On the other hand, there are highly creative persons who only function superbly in a specific area of interest and are not better-equipped for problem-solving beyond their expertise, for example when it comes to their health needs.

Prior research, including a landmark <u>study</u> from Seattle on the "Relationship Between Personality and Cognition," has shown that <u>attitude</u> <u>and outlook on life</u> were important components for maintaining the mental health of seniors in their '70s and '80s.

Experimentation, openness to new ideas and flexibility in dealing with changes are the essence of creativity, and they are also crucial ingredients for healthy cognitive aging, the researchers say.

Thankfully, you don't have to be a genius or maestro yourself to stay healthy and vital. Even just loving to read, attending art performances, and keeping stimulating social ties can yield enormous benefits throughout life, according to a <u>study</u> on creativity and aging, which was sponsored by the *National Endowment for the Arts*.

Seniors between the ages of 63 and 103 who participated in a variety of weekly art programs were found to be in better health, had fewer doctor visits, and used less medication in comparison to a control group that attended no such activities. They also showed better results in mental health tests, and were overall more involved in their communities.

Creativity can find fertile ground anywhere. But it takes a personal decision and commitment to openness to change as well as acceptance of risk, including risk of failure. Conservatism, hunkering down in the hope that things will remain the same, is not helpful and hampers any creative process. That doesn't mean everything from the past has to be overthrown and redone from scratch. But it can require rethinking some old traits that may no longer serve us well. Or, what has been overlooked for some time may regain relevance when seen in a different light.

The beauty of aging is that there is room for new perspectives based on hindsight and greater appreciation for the preciousness of time. It is also a most humbling phase in life when we realize how little, if anything, we are able to accomplish beyond the narrow horizon of our short existence. And yet, it is up to each of us how our days, up to the last, continue to unfold.

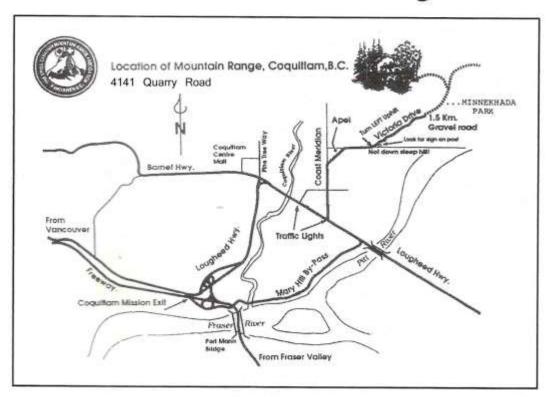

Die Handlung spielt in British Columbia und in den Northwest Territories. Hier eine Zusammenfassung des Inhalts:

#### "Gefährliche Spurensuche in Kanada; Diamanten, Verrat und Mord"

Die 33-jährige Historikerin Sonja Werner reist im Auftrag eines Schweizer Museums durch die kanadische Provinz British Columbia. Offiziell folgt sie den Spuren der Berliner Dichterin Else Seel (1894-1973), die einen kanadischen Trapper geheiratet und mit ihm in einer Blockhütte in der Wildnis gelebt hatte.

Heimlich folgt Sonja aber auch den Spuren ihres Mannes Toni, eines Extremsportlers, der drei Jahre zuvor mit seinem Sohn Nicky bei einem mysteriösen Absturz seines Wasserflugzeugs in British Columbia umgekommen war. Sonja will endlich herausfinden, was ihr die Polizei verheimlicht. Sie vermutet auch, dass ihre langjährige Freundin Odette aus seltsamen Gründen untergetaucht ist, denn seit dem Flugzeugabsturz ist sie verschwunden.

Auf ihrer Reise begegnet Sonja immer wieder dem Mineningenieur Robert Stanford. Auch der Buschpilot Sam scheint mehr zu wissen, als er preisgibt. Und im Leben der Kanadierin Diane Kesowsky, Sonjas grosszügiger Gastgeberin, gibt es dunkle Geheimnisse.

In einem Camp von Diamantensuchern in der kanadischen Subarktis, wo Sonja bei ihren Nachforschungen schließlich landet, muss die Historikerin um ihr Leben bangen. Zum Schluss findet sie heraus, dass sich alles, aber auch wirklich alles ganz anders verhält, als sie je geahnt hat."

# 60 Years ago in the Swiss Herald Chosen by Christina Lips

#### ALBERT EINSTEIN

On April 18th, 1955
news paper headlines informed us
that Albert Einstein, called the
worlds leading
scientist had passed away.

Neither the editor nor probably many of our readers understand fully

the "Theory of Relativity" we owe him.
Einstein was born in Ulm 1879. In the
1890's his family moved to Aarau, where
Albert Einstein attended High School. He
finished his studies at the Federal Polytechnicum in Zürich, acquiring there that
solid mathematical and technical knowledge
which enabled him later not only to feel
but to prove scientifically the nature of
the physical universe and the laws governing it.

From 1902 to 1909 Einstein worked as a patent examiner for the Swiss Government in Berne. It is during this time that he developed his fundamental theory, scribbling his theories on scrape of paper which he thrust out of sight, whenever a supervisor approached.

By his work he became a lecturer at University of Berne, then in the year extraordinary professor of physics at University of Zürich. Followed periods professor in Prague, Berlin and Prins USA.

At his death, President Eisenhower ted: "No other man contributed so must the vast expansion of the twentieth ome ry knowledge, yet no other man was modest in the possession of power that knowledge, more sure that power with wisdom is deadly?

Albert Einstein, born a German nation acquired Swiss citizenship in Zürich 1910. He refused to relinquish his Scitizenship when he worked for the dead Governement in perlin and became USA come in 1940 after he had left Germany Hitler took over.
