In Loving Memory of Werner Waefler September 28th, 1923 - February 17th, 2023

Werner Waefler passed away peacefully on February 17th. Werner was the youngest of ten children born in the Swiss Alps in the village of Frutigen. Werner and his brother Hans came to Canada when Wyssen Crane line sent the two young men overseas to expand the company in Quebec. They later went West where they worked in sawmills and the two boys joined the Swiss Society in Vancouver. Werner met his wife Ruth, a travelling Swiss nurse and avid hiker, through the Society and they were married in 1962. The couple eventually settled in Langley where Ruth worked as a nurse and Werner had a long career at Weiser Lock.

They had two sons, Andrew and Daniel. Both boys returned to Switzerland where they spent time in the army and met Swiss wives and settled down. Unfortunately, Andrew passed away at age 30 leaving behind his wife Irene and young daughter Alexandra.

However, despite her early loss, Alexandra married and had two great grandchildren for Werner. Daniel, the younger son of Werner, married Daniela and the couple had Werner's two other grandchildren Zoe and Nicolas Dimitri. Werner was very proud of his children and grandchildren and talked about them often despite the long distance from Canada. Ruth and Werner later retired to White Rock where Werner loved to garden and work in his wood shop. When Ruth's health started to decline, the couple moved into Chartwell Gardens where Ruth passed away in 2015. Werner then spent the following years woodworking with his friend Case, planting a rose garden in memory of Ruth, writing poetry, dining with friends, and walking with Lynn. Werner passed away peacefully in his 99th year at his home in bed just like he wanted.



This past June, Werner's son Daniel organized a beautiful Celebration of Life in Frutigen, Switzerland where Werner's ashes were spread on the alpine rhododendron by the lake as per Werner's wishes. All of Werner's grandchildren were in attendance and many of his numerous nieces and nephews. It was a beautiful celebration and day that would have made Werner smile. Rest in peace L.O.M.

CHRISTMAS MISCELLANEOUS

1. D Every year, approximately five to six million Christmas trees are grown in Canada; nearly all of them are harvested from Christmas tree farms. On average, Canadian trees need seven to 10 years to reach the right height for harvesting.
