





It is with profound sadness that we announce the passing of our father, Josef (Joe) Morach on September 22, 2025.

Joe was born in Zurich, Switzerland in 1933, where he apprenticed as a fur cutter. In 1958 he and a friend traveled to North America by ship to check things out for a few weeks. Arriving in New York Harbour to a full fireworks display, Joe couldn't believe this welcome party, just for their ship! He later learned this party was celebrated every year as it was July 4th. His friend returned to Switzerland, but Joe continued his longest holiday ever and eventually found his way out to Vancouver and made it his home.

Joe found work at Shaughnessy Golf & Country Club, working in various positions. He retired in 1996 after 37 years as the Club's Bar Manager.

He met Connie at work and they married in 1961. They had two children, Christian and Colette and they built a life in Vancouver, making numerous lifelong friends in both the Swiss and German Communities.

Joe was an avid crossbow shooter with the Swiss Crossbow Association and was the Range Master for many years. He was always proud and excited to travel back to Switzerland and compete as part of the Canadian Team, bringing home medals and cups every match.

He was also an avid Jass player and always very competitive. For many years he planned the annual Swiss Society Jass Tournament held at the Swiss Canadian Mountain Range Association Club House and held the title of Jass Konig on more than one occasion.

Joe lived a robust 92 years, always celebrating. Everyone will remember Joe as the story telling life of the party, always ready to socialize with young and old alike.

He was very proud to be Swiss and passed on many traditions to his family.

Joe leaves behind his son Christian (Jeanette), his daughter Colette (Douglas) and 3 grandchildren; Griffin, Nicole and Jenna, along with extended family.

Joe leaves many lifelong friends, both in Canada and Switzerland to remember him.

At his request there will not be a celebration of life, just raise a glass (Robert Mondavi if you have it) and offer a "cheers" to Joe.


THE SWISS SOCIETY OF VANCOUVER ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING (AGM)

Hello Swiss Society of Vancouver.



BIRCHERMUESLI: FROM CURE TO CULT

Everyone knows it, many consume it regularly, but only a few know the origins of this speciality – the revolutionary idea of a Swiss doctor. Bircher müesli is one of the best-known and most popular Swiss dishes.

At the end of the 19th century, middle-class society was convinced that eating fresh fruit and vegetables should be avoided in order to prevent infections and digestive problems. It was considered better to eat meat, which was considered richer and more nutritious.

A Swiss doctor was of a different opinion: Maximilian Oskar Bircher-Benner from Aargau firmly believed in the health benefits of a raw food diet and considered cooked and processed foods to be harmful.



In 1895 Bircher-Benner treated a patient's persistent stomach pain with a diet of raw vegetables. Bircher-Benner then began to use raw food to treat his own jaundice.

He also prescribed it to patients at his sanatorium "Lebendige Kraft" (living power), which opened on the Zürichberg in 1904. Over the years, the clinic has hosted famous names such as the King of Siam, the Tsars of Russia, and authors Hermann Hesse and Thomas Mann.

According to the book *Lebendige Kraft : Max Bircher-Benner und sein Sanatorium im historischen Kontext* (Living power: Max Bircher-Benner and his sanatorium in a historical context), Hesse is said to have described the sanatorium as a "hygienic penitentiary" in reference to Bircher-Benner's strict health regime, to which the patients always submitted voluntarily.

Inspired by the diet of people in the Alps, who ate fruit, nuts, milk and oatmeal in the evening, Bircher-Benner developed a new recipe for his clientele.

The original Bircher-Müesli recipe calls for soaking a tablespoon of rolled oats in three tablespoons of water for 12 hours and then adding a tablespoon of condensed milk, the juice of half a lemon, a whole grated apple and a tablespoon of chopped nuts or almonds.

The apple is the real main ingredient in the recipe, as it is used whole – with peel and core. This is why Bircher-Müesli was originally called "apple dessert" and was eaten in the evening.

Bircher-Benner's philosophy attracted many people, especially from the wealthy German-speaking regions of Switzerland, who were looking for a different lifestyle from that of increasing industrialisation.

From the 1920s onwards, his ideas spread to many European countries and his writings were translated into various languages.

Between the 1930s and 1940s, Bircher-Müesli became part of the dietary preferences of Swiss families and also found its way into institutions such as schools, prisons, nursing homes, monasteries and the military. Muesli mixes were also launched on the market.

Today there are countless industrially produced varieties of Bircher-Müesli on the market.

As a symbol of healthy and natural nutrition, Bircher-Müesli has enjoyed increasing popularity since the ecological and nutrition-conscious wave of the 1980s.

Over time, the original recipe has evolved in many ways. Today there are numerous variations, some of which differ greatly from the original. Bircher-Müesli is mainly eaten for breakfast or as a snack, and some people even enjoy it for dinner.

Today we know that a plant-based, wholesome diet is beneficial to health. However, at the time of Bircher-Benner, his nutritional theories were revolutionary and were not recognised by official medicine.

Bircher-Müesli is therefore not just a simple Swiss recipe for success, but the product of a natural philosophy of life that has managed to transcend national borders and endure over time.
